

## **Editorial Principles**

1. “Eurasian Studies” Journal primarily composed of articles, reviews and analysis on politics, foreign policies, social problems, economy, culture, language, religion, nationality, environment and military topics covering the TİKA’s landscape of interests. While focusing on recent international norms and regional subjects, Journal prefers analytical and authentic works rather than being descriptive.
2. Articles must be written in 12 points, with Arial / Times New Roman fonts, single line spacing.
3. Though there is not an exact standard for the length, articles around 6000 to 9000 words (including postscripts) are preferred.
4. All diagrams, tables and graphics in an article must be organized and numbered in a proper manner.
5. Sender must provide a cover page in the beginning of the article, including details like; the title of the text, name(s) of the authors, information about the places they are working for, mail and e-mail addresses, phone number, ID number and bank accounts.
6. There must be an abstract, the title of the text and keywords in English and Turkish in the beginning of the text.

### **7. Post scripting:**

Post scripting should be created electronically in numbered form with direct references at the end of the page through the use of “Add” function in Microsoft Word and must be in size of 10pts. The articles provided in this section must be written in quoted form in italics. Names of the books, articles and documents must be relevant to the original text. In texts written in foreign languages, connectors and abbreviations must be consistent. References must be written in full form when they are mentioned for the first time (including Publication, Place of Publication, and Publication Date), then following postscripts it can be referred as ‘ibid, p...’ As it can be referenced in full form each time, further use of same material can also just include author, title, page number. Internet-based references must be provided with the dates of retrieval.

### **8. Referencing Standards**

An alphabetical surname ordered “References” section must be included in the end of the text. If there are multiple authors, first of the authors surname must be considered, the rest of the authors must be written in (Name Surname) form. Author names must be clear.

**9.** Sent articles can't be published before, or sent to be published to other publications.

**10.** Articles in other forms than clearly stated here will not be evaluated and published, and no matter it is published or not, articles cannot be returned.

**12.** Eurasian Studies is a refereed journal. Publication committee has rights to publish or unpublished a text, considering the ideas of referees. Publication committee is authorised to revise the texts, in the light of authors' information if the articles is not compatible with the TİKA's publication policies.

**13.** Authors of the texts are paid accordingly to the TİKA's Publication Regulations Article 9, after the publication of the journal.

**14.** The articles and texts in this journal can be cited and/or quoted, as long as they are correctly referenced.
